


COLORADO PET ANIMAL IMPORTATION

At 65%, we have one of the highest rates of pet ownership in the country.

❖ And 47% of Colorado households have one or more dogs, making us the 8th highest dog-owning state.





COLORADO PET ANIMAL IMPORTATION


- Our spay/neuter programs have successfully lowered unwanted pet populations in our State, resulting in fewer animals available for adoption.
- ❖ Other parts of the country have not been as successful in managing pet overpopulation. In fact, five states account for more than half of the estimated 625,000 shelter animals euthanized every year in the U.S.⁽²⁾
- By transferring animals into our State for adoption, Colorado's shelters and rescues reduce the strain of unwanted pets throughout the U.S. and save thousands of animals from being euthanized.
- The top five states for imports into Colorado are New Mexico, Oklahoma, Texas, Kansas, and Arkansas.

PUPPY IMPORTATION INTO COLORADO

Puppies are of particular concern - consumer demand drives a **high volume** of imported animals, generally with a **high price tag**, and **rapid sale or adoption**, often before any health or behavioral concerns can be identified.





SOCIALLY CONSCIOUS ANIMAL COMMUNITY

The fundamental goal of a Socially Conscious Community is to create best outcomes for all animals. The responsibilities of Socially Conscious Shelters include:



Ensuring every unwanted or homeless pet has a safe place to go for shelter and care



Placing every healthy and safe animal



Assessing the medical and behavioral needs of homeless animals and ensuring these needs are thoughtfully addressed



Alleviating suffering and making appropriate euthanasia decisions



Aligning policy with the needs of the community



Enhancing the human-animal bond through thoughtful placements and post adoption support



Considering the health and wellness of each animal and each community when transferring animals between communities



Fostering a culture of transparency, ethical decision making, mutual respect, continual learning and collaboration

can help create a Socially Conscious Animal Community by:



Partnering with Socially Conscious shelters



Supporting the fundamental tenets of Socially Conscious Sheltering



Focusing your programs on animals who struggle within shelter systems



Helping move animals to locations where they are most likely to be adopted



THE WAY FORWARD FOR COLORADO

- Codify best practices and high standards of care by establishing the "Colorado Socially Conscious Sheltering Act."
- Require a **full veterinary examination** be conducted by a **licensed Colorado veterinarian** on **all** pet animals prior to adoption or sale, not just puppies and not just those being imported into the State.
 - ◆ Protects Colorado consumers from unknowingly buying or adopting sick and/or diseased animals, leaving them "holding the bag" should their pet become seriously ill or die.
 - ♦ Protects employees and patrons of Colorado's pet animal care facilities from disease transmittable to humans.
 - ◆ Protects Colorado consumers and communities from animals with serious behavioral issues.
 - ♦ Protects pet animals in Colorado by ensuring their medical and behavioral needs are assessed and thoughtfully addressed prior to adoption or sale.

For all periods, excludes: rescues and shelters that did not import any adult or juvenile dogs into Colorado; pet transporters; for-profit shelters; out-of-state shelters reporting in Colorado; and miscellaneous organizations not otherwise classified as a rescue or shelter. Certain data gaps exist in PACFA's 2017 and 2018 Animal Shelter and Rescue Individual Statistics reports, which impact one rescue's 2017 statistics and two rescues' 2018 statistics. In each case, it is assumed that the number of puppies and dogs imported into Colorado for that rescue and that year approximate the two years that were reported.

Rescues - \$425 adoption fee is based on August 2020 web research, primarily on Petfinder.com and individual rescue websites. **Pet Stores** - \$1,940 sale price is based on August 2020 research on Puppyfind.com. Value is based on advertised prices for 87 puppies of varying breeds between the ages of 7 and 12 weeks. The calculated average is \$2,150 sale price per puppy, which has been reduced to \$1,940 for conservatism.

Shelters - \$325 adoption fee is based on August 2020 web research and includes the eight largest shelters as measured by number of puppies imported into Colorado. These shelters make up 80% of the total puppies coming into Colorado.

- (6) Violation data obtained from PACFA under the Colorado Open Records Act.
